Weekly Round Up

Equity Markets

Global equity markets ended mostly higher last week, as recent fall in commodity prices eased worries about inflation and the rate hike outlook. UK markets ended in positive territory in the last week, amid gains in defensive sector stocks. On the data front, UK's house price index advanced to a record high for the fifth straight month in June, while the nation's house price index unexpectedly advanced in the same month. Meanwhile, Britain's inflation accelerated to a 40-year high in May. European markets finished mixed during the week. On the macro front, Euro-zone's consumer confidence index unexpectedly dropped in June, recording its lowest level since the early months of the pandemic, while the region's services PMI dropped more than market forecast in June. Additionally, Euro-zone's current account deficit widened in April, while the region's construction output declined for the first time in four months in April. Separately, Germany's, both, manufacturing and services PMIs declined in June. US markets closed on a stronger footing in the previous week, helped by gains in technology sector stocks. On the data front, the US existing home sales fell to a 2-year low in May, while the nation's Chicago Fed National activity index dropped in May. Additionally, the US weekly initial jobless claims declined less than expected in the week ended 17 June 2022, while the nation's current account deficit widened more than expected in 1Q 2022. Asian markets finished mostly higher during the week, tracking gains in their US counterparts.

- In the UK, the FTSE 100 index rose 2.7% to end the week at 7,208.81, while the FTSE 250 advanced 1.0% to close at 19,123.71.
- Amongst European markets, the DAX shed 0.1% to finish the week at 13,118.13.
- In the US, DJIA gained 5.4% to end the week at 31,500.68, and the S&P 500 index added 6.4% to end at 3,911.74.

Currency Markets

- The EUR ended higher against the USD in the prior week, following the European Central Bank's hawkish stance.
- The GBP ended higher against the USD last week, after UK's consumer price index (CPI) climbed to a 40-year high in May.
- The USD ended mostly lower against its peers in the previous week, amid decline in the US Treasury yields.
- The GBP rose 0.2% against the USD to finish at 1.2268, while the EUR gained 0.5% against the USD to close at 1.0553.

Gold

- Gold prices fell last week, on prospects of further rate hikes.
- Gold prices declined 0.6% to close the week at \$1,830.30/oz.

Commodities

- Brent oil prices remained flat in the last week.
- Brent crude oil prices remained flat at \$113.12/barrel.

Corporate News and Updates

- Airline sector stocks gained a lot of attention last week. easyJet announced that its Spanish cabin crew revealed plans to strike for nine days in July, demanding a 40% hike in basic salary. Peer, International Consolidated Airlines Group announced that its checking and ground handling staff employed at Heathrow voted in favour of strike action over wage dispute.
- In other corporate news, JD Sports Fashion's annual profits more than doubled.

PwC awards staff bumper pay deal:

Thousands of staff at audit giant PwC will enjoy bumper pay rises of at least 9% this week — the latest sign of the pressure that major employers are under to combat the cost-of-living crisis and retain workers in a highly competitive jobs market. About 11,000 PwC staff, roughly half its workforce, will receive the inflation-matching 9 per cent rise in what is thought to be its biggest pay award for a decade. This year's pay round will cost the company £120 million, while the bonus pool is also rising by £10 million to £138 million.

Deals face added scrutiny under new national security legislation:

The government called in 17 takeover deals for full assessments under new national security laws in the first three months of the year. Three of those were approved and the remaining 14 were still being examined at the end of March, according to the first annual report on the National Security and Investment Act. At least one more of these looks likely to be approved soon. The government said that it was minded to pass the takeover by the U.S.-owned defence business Cobham of Ultra Electronics, a FTSE 250 maker of systems such as sonar and radio communications used by the military and civilian aircraft.

BP reveals \$120 million North Sea tax bill:

BP paid tax on its U.K. North Sea business in 2021 for the first time in at least six years as it settled historical matters with the taxman. The oil company said that it had paid a net tax bill of \$119.4 million for its British oil and gas production business, accounting for just over 2 per cent of its global tax bill for oil and gas extraction of \$5 billion.

Sanofi-GSK vaccine alliance acts as booster for team of rivals:

Late-stage trials of a Covid-19 vaccine being developed by Sanofi and GSK have shown promising results, particularly against people infected with the Omicron variant of the virus. The French and British pharmaceutical companies said the vaccine had proved effective in 72% of adults with Omicron variants, rising to 93% for those with prior immunity or another vaccination.

Oil rig maker forced to seek cut-price takeover:

Investors in Lamprell headed for the exit after the maker of oil rigs and wind turbine foundations warned that it would imminently run out of cash and was in talks with a major shareholder over a cut-price takeover. The offshore energy services group, worth more than £90 million before news, said it was seeking other buyers and warned that shareholders may be wiped out unless it can secure financing "in the very near term".

Essentra sells packaging business for £312 million:

Essentra, the FTSE 250 group, has sold its packaging business to Austria's Mayr-Melnhof Group, marking a "significant" step towards becoming a pure-play components business. The Milton Keynes-based plastic and fibre products maker sold ESNT Packaging & Securing Solutions and Essentra Packaging US, along with subsidiaries, for £312 million in cash.

Bulb loses £600 per customer as deadline for bids nears:

Collapsed energy supplier Bulb has lost nearly £600 for each customer on its books since it was bailed out by taxpayers last November as ministers try to find a buyer. Bulb has racked up an £886 million loss in the six months since nationalisation, a progress report from Teneo, the administrators, revealed. The company has about 1.5 million customers, so it has lost nearly £600 for each household to which it supplies gas and electricity.

Ministers urged to intervene in Chinese deal for aerospace supplier AIM Altitude:

Ministers are facing calls to block Chinese state ownership of a veteran British aerospace company that designs aircraft interiors for Boeing and Airbus. Since 2016, Bournemouth-based AIM Altitude has been owned by the state-controlled Aviation Industry Corporation of China (AVIC), which paid £155 million for the business at a time when relations with the country were good. Last week, AIM Altitude, which has 600 staff, went through a restructuring via a pre-pack administration and was bought by ACS U.K. another division of AVIC.

Woodford stock pick 4D Pharma collapses:

A drugmaker that was once a British biotech star worth more than £600 million has gone into an administration that could wipe out hundreds of small shareholders. 4D Pharma, which won early backing from fallen stockpicker Neil

Woodford, suspended its shares Safter its lender demanded repayment of a \$12.5 million (£10.2 million) loan. It said efforts to secure extra funding had "proved challenging".

British Airways: Heathrow Ground Staff to Strike Next Month:

Around 700 British Airways staff at the airline's main hub, Heathrow, are expected to walk out next month after voting overwhelmingly for industrial action over a pay claim. Members of the GMB union voted, with 95% in favour of a strike. The turn-out was 80%. Members of the Unite union are also expected to vote for strike action. The unions say the members who voted to strike are primarily low paid women. They are demanding that BA reinstates a 10% cut taken from them during the pandemic. They claim "bosses pay has returned to pre-pandemic levels," with Luis Gallego – chief executive for BA's parent company, IAG – in line for a £4.9 million payout this year.

Britain's 'green revolution' should have boosted this stock, instead it lost 90pc: A company has promising technology and a big market to sell it into, but something prevents all that promise from turning into profits and the shares collapse. This is the situation with Tekmar, the supplier of protection systems to undersea cables and pipes, which we added to our Inheritance Tax (IHT) Portfolio in December 2020. But the company has struggled to turn that

potential into cash and now finds itself in a financially precarious position. Its plans were blown off course by the pandemic and it suffered a series of delays with contracts. A new management team has done its best by controlling costs and by selling new shares to raise money, but continuing losses threaten to undo that good work.

This is even though the company is still winning big contracts, such as one to supply a cable protection system for the Dogger Bank wind farm off the east coast of England and a \$10 million (£8.2 million) contract for pipeline support and protection from "a major subsea customer in the Middle East" – Tekmar's largest single contract award to date. But in its interim report published last week its bosses were candid about the hole the company found itself in.

The company is not selling itself from a position of strength. There remains the danger that things deteriorate further, especially if no buyer is found and the company is unable to renew those loan facilities in the autumn. Some investors may want to hang on in the hope that the market has overreacted, but it will take what little is on the table now and sell.

The market is signalling its doubts about the company's ability to return to profitability and its bosses have acknowledged its plight by announcing, on the day of the results, that they are putting it up for sale. Questor says "Sells".

Tech firms under pressure to safeguard user data as abortion prosecutions loom: Private information collected and retained by companies could be weaponized to prosecute abortion seekers and providers. Such data has already been used to prosecute people for miscarriages and pregnancy termination in states with strict abortion laws, including one case in which a woman's online search for abortion pills was brought against her in court. This kind of legal response may now become more widespread, said Imran Ahmed, chief executive officer of advocacy groups the Center for Countering Digital Hate.

Parking fines: DVLA breached law over sharing drivers' details: The Driver and Vehicle Licensing Agency (DVLA) breached data protection laws in the way it passed on motorists' personal details to private parking firms, the UK's data watchdog has ruled. It could now potentially face compensation

claims from motorists as a result, according to one expert. The Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) has decided the DVLA "was not using the correct lawful basis to disclose vehicle keeper information", Guardian Money can reveal.

Rome to impose new rules to curb 'wild west' e-scooter incidents: Authorities in Rome are to impose new electric scooter rules, such as restricting use to adults with ID, after several crashes and near-misses in the city. The e-scooter rental market has boomed in recent years, with 14,500 scooters currently available in the Italian capital, provided by seven licensed companies. Authorities concerned about riders speeding, mounting pavements and abandoning vehicles. Authorities are moving to clamp down on the situation, including people riding on pavements and sometimes with more than one person on board.

FDA ban on Juul e-cigarettes temporarily halted: Juul can continue to sell its electronic cigarettes, at least for now, after a federal appeals court temporarily blocked a government ban. Juul filed an emergency motion earlier, seeking the temporary hold while it appeals the sales ban. The e-cigarette maker had asked the court to pause what it called an "extraordinary and unlawful action" by the Food and Drug Administration that would have required it to immediately halt its business.

Train services cut as RMT rail strike enters third day: Rail firms ask people not to travel as 40,000 union members strike in dispute over pay and conditions. Passengers across Great Britain face a weekend of disrupted train services as the third and final 24-hour leg of the biggest rail strike in 30 years. Rail firms have repeated pleas for people to avoid travelling unless necessary, with only about 20% of trains expected to operate in a limited window. Despite the strikes, frequent services were still able to operate on Saturday morning. However, Sunday services will start later and be slightly reduced. Passengers with advance tickets will be allowed to use them until Tuesday or get a full refund.

City sources say Euromoney likely to be broken up if deal to buy media and events group is successful: Euromoney is likely to be broken up if a deal to buy the media and events group is successful, say City sources. The FTSE250 firm said last week it was in talks with private equity firms Astorg and Epiris. The announcement was prompted by revelations in The Mail that the company had been approached. Argus Media, backed by buyout groups Hg and General Atlantic, is also seen as a possible bidder. But the approach by Astorg and Epiris values Euromoney at 15 times its earnings before interest, tax, depreciation and amortisation – a 'fairly full price', two of the sources said. Euromoney, Hg, GA and Argus Media declined to comment.

Owner of Generator Hostels understood to be considering a sale that could value it at up to £1 billion: The owner of Generator Hostels is understood to be

considering a sale that could value it at up to £1 billion. The process was overseen by investment bank Goldman Sachs, but was halted by the pandemic.
