Weekly Round Up

Equity Markets

Global equity markets ended mostly higher last week. UK markets ended in positive territory in the last week, amid weakness in the British Pound, after the Bank of England (BoE) stated that interest rates would go up less in future. On the macro front, UK's BRC shop price index advanced at its highest rate since at least 2005 in September. Meanwhile, UK's manufacturing PMI dropped at its fastest rate since May-2020 in October, while the nation's services PMI fell at its fastest pace since January 2021 in October. Additionally, UK's mortgage approvals declined more than forecasted in September, while the nation's consumer credit fell to its lowest level since December 2021 in the same month. European markets finished in the green during the week, amid upbeat corporate earnings reports. On the economic front, Euro-zone's gross domestic product (GDP) rose as anticipated in 3Q 2022, while the region's consumer price index (CPI) climbed to a record high in October. On the flipside, Euro-zone's producer price index (PPI) declined more than forecasted in September. Separately, Germany's retail sales rebounded in September, while the nation's unemployment rate remained unchanged in October. On the contrary, Germany's manufacturing PMI fell more than expected in October. US markets closed lower in the previous week, as weak US economic data raised worries that the US Federal Reserve (Fed) would continue raising interest rates in future. In the economic news, the US ISM services PMI grew at its slowest pace in nearly 2-1/2 years in October, while the nation's ISM manufacturing activity rose at its slowest pace in nearly 2-1/2 years in the same month. Meanwhile, the US initial jobless claims unexpectedly eased in the week ended 28 October 2022, while the nation's JOLTS job openings advanced more than expected in September. Additionally, the US private sector advanced more than expected in October. Asian markets finished mostly higher during the week.

- In the UK, the FTSE 100 index rose 4.1% to end the week at 7,334.84, while the FTSE 250 advanced 2.4% to close at 18,341.57.
- Amongst European markets, the DAX climbed 1.6% to finish the week at 13,459.85.
- In the US, DJIA lost 1.4% to end the week at 32,403.22, and the S&P 500 index slid 3.3% to end at 3,770.55.

Currency Markets

- The EUR ended lower against the USD in the prior week, after Euro-zone's manufacturing PMI dropped to its lowest level since May 2020 in October.
- The GBP ended lower against the USD last week, after the BoE warned of a prolonged recession.
- The USD ended mostly lower against its peers in the previous week, after the US unemployment rate rose more than expected in October.
- The GBP fell 2.0% against the USD to finish at 1.1379, while the EUR shed 0.1% against the USD to close at 0.9957.

Gold

- Gold prices rose last week, amid weakness in the US Dollar.
- Gold prices advanced 1.9% to close the week at \$1676.60/oz.

Commodities

- Brent oil prices gained last week, amid hopes that China could ease Covid-19 restrictions.
- Brent crude oil prices rose 2.9% to \$98.57/barrel.

Corporate News and Updates

- Airlines sector stocks gained a lot of attention last week. EasyJet reported that International Airlines Group was reviving plans to consolidate the sector. Peer, Wizz Air Holdings after the company's interim losses widened.
- In other corporate news, Science Group announced that it has agreed to acquire TP Group for a cash consideration of £17.5 million.

National Grid payments for cutting electricity use to start 'in the coming days': Households could be paid for cutting their teatime electricity usage as soon as next week after National Grid launched a scheme to help prevent blackouts this winter. The company responsible for keeping the lights on said its new "demand flexibility service" had received approval from Ofgem and it aimed to carry out the first test "in the coming days".

Auditors in new warning over future of Clarks: Auditors to Clarks have repeated a warning that there may be a "material uncertainty" about the retailer's ability to continue as a going concern amid a downturn in consumer spending.











Scottish Ford dealership group books record profits but bumpy road lies ahead: Brian Gilda, Chairman of Scottish Ford dealership heavyweight Peoples, warned that “headwinds are coming” as he unveiled record profits despite a drop in sales at the group, which ranks as the largest independent dealership in Europe retailing only Ford cars and commercial vehicles. He said the worldwide shortage of semiconductors had impacted both vehicle volumes and turnover, but added that a “relentless focus on pursuing real business opportunities” alongside stronger margins had led to the record earnings. Pre-tax profits rose 6.2% to an all-time high of £8.48 million in the year to July 31, according to the latest accounts.
