Weekly Round Up

Equity Markets

Global equity markets ended lower last week, after major central banks aggressively raised their key interest rates. UK markets ended in negative territory in the last week, after the Bank of England (BoE) raised its key interest rates by 25 basis points, its largest hike in 13 years. On the data front, UK's gross domestic product (GDP) unexpectedly declined for a second consecutive month in April. Further, UK's industrial production unexpectedly dropped in April, while the nation's unemployment rate advanced for the first time in nearly a year in the three months to April. Meanwhile, UK's goods trade deficit narrowed more than expected in April. European markets finished in the red during the week, amid concerns over economic slowdown. On the macro front, Euro-zone's industrial production rose less than expected in April, while the region's trade deficit unexpectedly widened in April. Also, Euro-zone's economic sentiment index advanced less than expected in June. Separately, Germany's consumer price index (CPI) climbed in May, while the nation's current situation index rose more than market expectations in June. US markets closed on a weaker footing in the previous week, as recession fears heightened, after the US Federal Reserve (Fed) raised its key interest rate, its biggest hike since 1994. On the economic front, the US building permits fell more than expected in May, while the nation's housing starts dropped to a 13-month low in May. Additionally, the US housing market index declined in June, recording its lowest reading since June 2020. Meanwhile, the US initial jobless claims dropped in the week ended 10 June 2022. Asian markets finished mostly lower during the week, on recession fears.

- ❑ In the UK, the FTSE 100 index fell 4.1% to end the week at 7,016.25, while the FTSE 250 declined 3.8% to close at 18,925.91.
- ❑ Amongst European markets, the DAX shed 4.6% to finish the week at 13,126.26.
- ❑ In the US, DJIA lost 4.8% to end the week at 29,888.78, and the S&P 500 index slid 5.8% to end at 3,674.84.

- ❑ The EUR ended lower against the USD, following dismal economic data releases in the Euro-zone.
- ❑ The GBP ended lower against the USD, after UK's GDP declined in April.
- ❑ The USD ended higher against its peers, after the Fed raised its key interest rate.
- ❑ The GBP fell 0.6% against the USD to finish at 1.2241, while the EUR declined 0.2% against the USD to close at 1.0499.

- ❑ Gold prices fell last week, amid strength in the US Dollar.

- ❑ Brent oil prices dropped last week, amid worries about crude demand.

Tesco sales hit by 'unprecedented' cost of living increases: Sales at Tesco's British and Irish stores have fallen as shoppers begin to trade down to cheaper basics, with Ken Murphy, the supermarket chain's Chief Executive, warning that "customers are facing unprecedented increases in the cost of living".

Energy price rises help push SSE Chief's pay to £4.5 million: The head of SSE saw his pay package leap by 47% to £4.5 million last year as soaring energy prices drove up the power group's profits and shares. Alistair Phillips-Davies, 54, was paid a salary of more than £900,000 and received a £1.2 million annual bonus and a £2 million long-term share bonus. With pension contributions and other benefits, the Chief Executive's total package for 2021-22 increased by £1.4 million to reach by far the highest pay since he took the job in 2013.

Alphabet spells out the dangers of technology skills shortage: A technology skills shortage is a "risk to businesses and economic growth", the Chief Financial Officer of Alphabet, the owner of Google, has warned.

Supply shortages drive profits higher at Glencore: Commodity supply shortages and fluctuating prices after Russia's war in

Ukraine have boosted fortunes at Glencore, with trading profits expected to exceed annual profit forecasts during the first six months of the year. Adjusted profits for the London-listed, Swiss-based trading business are expected to be above \$3.2 billion for the first half of the year, above the top end of a long-term guidance range of between \$2.2 billion and \$3.2 billion.

Who What Wear deal takes Future to sixth place in U.S. media market: Future, the publisher of Marie Claire, Country Life and Wallpaper magazines, has added to its list of titles with the acquisition of Who What Wear, the U.S.-based women's online lifestyle magazine. The deal will make Future the sixth largest media company in America, measured on the audience tracking ComScore scale. Just four years ago it did not even feature on the list.

Playtech deal given extended deadline: A takeover of Playtech was looking more likely yesterday after a "put up or shut up" order against the Hong Kong-based bidder was extended for a second time. TT Bond Partners, which last year advised Gopher Investments on a possible bid, emerged as a bidder in its own right in February, but negotiations appeared to be proceeding at a glacial pace. However, one analyst said that securing a second extension from the Takeover Panel to July 15 was a sign that a deal was still likely, especially as it was backed by Mor Weizer, the Playtech Chief Executive.

Santander's North America head Héctor Grisi is new Chief Executive: Santander has named the Mexican-born Héctor Grisi as its new Chief Executive, finally moving on from 2018's botched attempt to hire Andrea Orcel, the Italian banker.

Elon Musk tells Twitter staff to expect job cuts: Elon Musk addressed Twitter employees yesterday for the first time since announcing his planned \$44 billion takeover of the social media company and said he thought jobs would have to be cut.

markets seize up and buyers grow nervy amid a consumer downturn. U.S. private equity giant Apollo and Mukesh Ambani's Reliance Industries tabled a joint bid this month that is about £1.5 billion below the £7 billion asking price, although Boots' U.S. owner Walgreens may keep a stake. Meanwhile, there are big doubts over whether a rival bid will emerge from the Issa brothers and private equity firm TDR, the joint owners of Asda.

Novalpina's €1 million payment adds new twist to spyware scandal: Directors of the private equity firm at the heart of an international spyware scandal are facing fresh scrutiny over a €1 million payment to a family member. Novalpina Capital is best known for owning a majority stake in the Israeli spyware firm NSO Group, which is behind the Pegasus surveillance technology used to spy on journalists and political activists.

Fortunately we can report three divi increases from our Income Portfolio holdings this week. The biggest increase by far, and the only one to exceed the current rate of inflation, was the 19.7% rise in the second-half dividend from Sirius Real Estate, the operator of German business parks that recently gained a toehold in Britain. It will pay 2.37 euro cents, compared with 1.98 cents for the same period last year. This takes the divi for the full year to 4.41 cents, an increase of 16.1% compared with 3.8 cents in 2021. At the current exchange rate of €1.17 to the pound the annual divi would be 3.8p. Relative to the current share price of 94.1p this would give a yield of 4%; relative to our purchase price of 74p in November 2019 the yield is

5.1%. The dividend is very well covered by earnings as the company has a policy to pay just 65% of its "funds from operations", a measure of cash flow used by property companies, in dividends. Big, inflation-beating dividend rises are nothing new from Sirius Real Estate. In the 2018 financial year the company paid 3.16 cents, followed by 3.36 cents (a 6.3% rise), 3.57 cents (6.3% again) and 3.8 cents (6.5% higher). This year's second-half payment is due on Aug 18. The company's net asset value per share increased by 15.5% to 102.04 cents, or 87.2p at the current exchange rate. This puts the shares at a premium of 7.9%, which we can tolerate in view of the company's rapid growth. Questor says "Hold".
