Weekly Round Up

Equity Markets

Global equity markets ended mostly higher last week, as China eased its Covid19 restrictions. UK markets ended in negative territory in the last week, amid concerns over rising inflation. On the macro front, UK's mortgage approvals declined to a 2-year low level in April. On the flipside, UK's BRC shop price index climbed at its fastest rate in more than a decade in April, while the Nationwide house prices advanced in May. European markets finished mostly lower during the week, amid concerns about the cost-of-living crisis. On the economic front, Euro-zone's business climate index dropped in May, while the region's unemployment rate remained steady in April. Also, Euro-zone's services PMI fell in May. Meanwhile, Euro-zone's inflation climbed to a record high in May, reaching its highest level in history. Further, Euro-zone's consumer confidence index advanced as expected in May. Separately, Germany's CPI advanced at its fastest pace since 1952 in May, while the nation's unemployment rate remained unchanged in May. Moreover, Germany's manufacturing PMI rose in May, while the nation's trade surplus widened in April. On the flipside, Germany's retail sales unexpectedly dropped in April. US markets closed on a weaker footing in the previous week, amid concerns about rising inflation. On the data front, the US ADP employment rose less than expected in May, while the nation's construction spending rose less than expected in the same month. Moreover, the US factory orders rose less than expected in April, while the nation's ISM services PMI dropped more than expected in May. On the contrary, the US JOLTS job openings advanced in April, while the nation's initial jobless claims fell more than estimated in the week ended 27 May 2022. Additionally, the US ISM manufacturing PMI rose more than expected in May, while the nation's nonfarm payrolls rose more than market forecast in May. Asian markets finished higher during the week.

In the UK, the FTSE 100 index fell 0.7% to end the week at 7,532.95, while the FTSE 250 declined 0.5% to close at 20,272.9.

Amongst European markets, the DAX shed 0.2% to finish the week at 14,460.09.

In the US, DJIA lost 0.9% to end the week at 32,899.70, and the S&P 500 index slid 1.2% to end at 4,108.54.

Currency Markets

The EUR ended lower against the USD in the prior week, after Euro-zone's retail sales unexpectedly declined in April.

The GBP ended lower against the USD last week, amid concerns over UK's economic growth outlook.

The USD ended mixed against its peers in the previous week.

The GBP fell 1.1% against the USD to finish at 1.2488, while the EUR declined 0.1% against the USD to close at 1.0719.

Gold

Gold prices fell last week, following robust US jobs data.

Gold prices declined 0.4% to close the week at \$1,850.20/oz.

Commodities

Brent oil prices rose last week, after the US crude inventories fell more than expected, amid high demand for fuel.

Brent crude oil prices rose 0.2% to \$119.72/barrel.

Corporate News and Updates

Property sector stocks gained a lot of attention last week. Countryside Partnerships announced that its shareholder, Inclusive Capital approached the company with a takeover offer worth £1.47 billion. Peer, Foxtons Group announced the appointment of Guy Gitten as its new Chief Executive Officer.

Melrose sale leaves focus on GKN businesses: The industrial turnaround specialist that bought GKN in 2018 after an acrimonious £8 billion bid battle has sold the remaining business from its previous big deal.

Find a buyer, Countryside urged by leading investor Browning West: The largest investor in Countryside Partnerships has urged the company to find a buyer after it rebuffed a £1.5 billion bid approach this week.

Russian stake sale to hit profits at Allianz: Europe's biggest insurance company is set to suffer a €400 million hit to its profits after agreeing to sell a majority stake in its Russian operations.

Decking is the latest bolt-on acquisition for CRH: A London-listed, Dublin-based construction group has set out to capitalise on the growing trend for people to entertain at home by buying a North American producer of timber fencing and decking.

Crossrail link pushes rents to new highs: Rents have jumped in some of the areas through which the new Elizabeth line runs, with tenants prepared to pay more to live in places with fast connections to London. Rents towards either end of the line — which runs from Heathrow and Reading in the west, through central London and east to Abbey Wood and Shenfield in Essex — have risen the most in the past eight years.

Grubhub founder mulled bid for Just Eat Takeaway's U.S. arm: The founder of Grubhub teamed up with U.S. private equity giant General Atlantic in an audacious attempt to buy back the company he sold to Just Eat Takeaway for \$7.3 billion last year, it can be revealed.

All change at the top for New Look and Asos: Two of Britain's biggest fashion retailers are poised to appoint new Chief Executives, as Asos lines up José Antonio Ramos Calamonte and New Look boss Nigel Oddy prepares to stand down. Ramos Calamonte, 50, currently Asos's Chief Commercial Officer, is the frontrunner to replace former boss Nick Beighton. The search was delayed by Asos's pursuit of Rob Hattrell, head of eBay's European arm, who turned down the job.

FirstGroup's biggest investor attacks takeover bid: The biggest shareholder in bus and trains giant FirstGroup has urged it to reject the recent £1.2 billion takeover approach from a U.S. private equity firm. Schroders owns a near-18% stake in FirstGroup, which operates Avanti West Coast, Great Western Railway and South Western Railway. In an unusual public statement for a blue-chip fund manager, it criticised the offer from I Squared Capital as being "unattractive" and failing to reflect the scarcity value of one of the few big U.K. bus and train groups.

City firms fail on diversity two years after Black Lives Matter pledges: In many ways, it's a typical mentor-mentee relationship. A 43-year-old insurance executive paired up with a 20-year-old economics student who wants to work in finance. But there's a twist: the 20-year-old is the mentor.

Short sellers attack JD Sports and Bridgepoint: Short-sellers have piled into JD Sports after the sudden ousting of Executive Chairman Peter Cowgill last month, in a sign that some investors have grown more sceptical about the retailer's prospects. Short positions — where traders bet a company's share price will decline — have risen to 1.29% of JD's shares outstanding, equivalent to £81.3 million, according to S&P Global Market Intelligence.

Investors demand change of the guard at Palace Capital: Big shareholders in Palace Capital are pushing for a shake-up of the £130 million property firm's strategy after

growing impatient at its pedestrian returns. Palace Capital, run by veteran Neil Sinclair, markets itself as a play on levelling up. It owns offices, warehouses and leisure facilities in regional cities around the U.K. Over the past five years its shares have declined 26% to 271.8p, leaving it trading at a 25% discount to the value of its assets.

Bank of England should have moved sooner to curb inflation, says ex central banker Davies: Sir Howard Davies has little sympathy for central banks complaining they can do little to tame inflation. Neither has he any truck with those who claim that the Bank of England's independence over interest rates is to blame for prices rising at their fastest pace for 40 years.

Until four days ago this looked like a really bad tip. Now it seems almost inspired: Until seven o'clock on Monday morning, Questor's purchase in September 2019 of Oxford Metrics, the Aim-quoted tech company, for our Inheritance Tax Portfolio had looked like a poor decision: the shares, tipped at 89.5p, had closed last week at 78.5p. But then the company put out the following statement over the Regulatory News Service, the key source of company updates: "Oxford Metrics today announces the sale of its infrastructure asset management division, Yotta, to Causeway Technologies for a cash consideration of £52 million." This compared with a market value for Oxford Metrics before the announcement of £100 million – and Yotta is by a long way the smaller of the company's two businesses. In the year to September last year it contributed 23% of the group's total sales and about 10pc of its "adjusted" profits before tax (on a statutory basis it made a loss). It's obvious then that Oxford Metrics got a good price for Yotta. Certainly the market thought so: the shares leapt on the news and ended the day 29% higher at 101p. We might legitimately wonder why they didn't rise further. The combined business is now worth about £127 million, which implies that the remainder once Yotta is detached is worth £75 million. However, if we take into account its current net cash of £23 million, the valuation of the remaining business itself is £52 million. If we valued it crudely as being worth nine times as much as Yotta, since it makes nine times the profits, it would be worth £468 million; if we used the sales breakdown of 77% to 23%,

the remainder would be worth £174 million – and these figures are before we add back the £52 million proceeds for Yotta and the £23 million in cash it already has. So it seems that the continuing business of Oxford Metrics, which goes by the name of Vicon and, as we explained in our original tip, makes advanced equipment that monitors and digitises the movements of human beings for customers such as Nasa and Adidas, is being implicitly undervalued by the market. Perhaps therefore it too could attract the attention of a bidder, in all probability an American one: not only are U.S. private equity houses awash with cash that they need to invest but their money now goes further if they spend it on British businesses thanks to the weakness of sterling. Questor says: "Hold".
