Weekly Round Up

Equity Markets

Global equity markets ended lower last week, on global economic growth concerns. UK markets ended in negative territory in the last week, on inflation worries. On the data front, UK's consumer confidence index dropped in May, recording its lowest level since records began in 1974. On the flipside, UK's inflation climbed to a 40-year high level in April, while the nation's house price index advanced in the same month. Additionally, UK's unemployment rate unexpectedly dropped to a 50-year low in the three months to March, while the nation's average earnings advanced in the same period. European markets finished in the red during the week, on global growth concerns. On the macro front, Euro-zone's consumer price index (CPI) advanced less than expected in April, while the nation's trade deficit widened in March. Moreover, Eurozone's consumer confidence declined more than expected in May. Separately, Germany's producer price index climbed more than estimated in April. US markets closed on a lower footing in the previous week, on recession fears. On the economic front, the US retail sales jumped in April, while the nation's industrial production rose for the fourth consecutive month in April. On the contrary, the US housing starts unexpectedly dropped in April, while the nation's building permits unexpectedly declined in the same month. Additionally, the US housing market index declined to a 2-year low in May, while the nation's existing sales declined to its lowest level since June 2020 in April. Also, the US NY Empire State manufacturing index unexpectedly fell in May. Asian markets finished higher during the week, tracking gains in their US counterparts.

- In the UK, the FTSE 100 index fell 0.4% to end the week at 7389.98, while the FTSE 250 declined 0.4% to close at 19835.95.
- Amongst European markets, the DAX shed 0.3% to finish the week at 13981.91.
- In the US, DJIA lost 2.9% to end the week at 31,261.90, and the S&P 500 index slid 3.0% to end at 3,901.36.

Currency Markets

- The EUR ended higher against the USD in the prior week, after Euro-zone's economy grew more than expected in the first quarter.
- The GBP ended higher against the USD last week, after UK's retail sales unexpectedly climbed in April.
- The USD ended lower against its peers in the previous week, after the US initial jobless claims climbed to a 4-month high level in the week ended 13 May 2022.
- The GBP rose 1.8% against the USD to finish at 1.248, while the EUR gained 1.5% against the USD to close at 1.0564 .

Gold

- Gold prices rose last week, amid weakness in the US Dollar and drop in the US Treasury yields.
- Gold prices advanced 2.2% to close the week at \$1,848.40/oz.

Commodities

- Brent oil prices advanced last week, even after government data showed the US refiners increased their crude output.
- Brent crude oil prices rose 0.9% to \$112.55/barrel.

Corporate News and Updates

- Telecommunications sector stocks gained a lot of attention last week. Airtel Africa announced that its subsidiary, SmartCash PSB, has launched operations in Nigeria. Peer, Vodafone Group announced that UAE-based Emirates Telecommunications Group Company PJSC (e&) acquired a 9.8% stake in the company for \$4.4 billion.
- In other corporate news, Aviva reiterated its annual guidance and reported a rise in its first quarter general insurance sales.

Deere in spotlight as it raises profit forecast: War in Ukraine and the consequent damage done to grain exports from Europe's "bread basket" have prompted one of the world's biggest tractor makers to increase its forecast for annual profits. Deere & Co said that gaps in grain imports triggered by Russia's invasion of Ukraine had driven the price of America's domestic crop higher, persuading U.S. farmers to upgrade their agricultural machinery.

Randall & Quilter postpone voting on takeover offer: The board of Randall & Quilter has given investors more time to decide if they want to accept a £482 million takeover offer for the Aim-listed insurer from an American investment firm.

Steve Rowe leaving M&S 'in better shape': When Steve Rowe bows out of Marks & Spencer next week after almost 40 years at the business, he will declare that the retailer is in better shape after stimulating sales of its clothing and increasing its profits.

Nick Train demands Woodford parties be 'sued or cleared': One of Britain's best-known fund managers has called on the City's chief regulator to "sue or exonerate" as an investigation into the collapse of Neil Woodford's investment empire enters its third year.

British tech champion Arm axes U.K. jobs as it prepares New York listing: Britain's biggest technology company Arm is cutting one in 10 jobs at its U.K. headquarters as its Japanese owners prepare to float the \$60 billion (£48 billion) semiconductor giant in America. Staff at Arm's Cambridge headquarters have been prepared to expect 340 to 350 job losses in the U.K., around a tenth of its 3,560 British staff, The Telegraph understands.

KPMG forces staff to take unconscious bias training: KPMG will make unconscious bias training mandatory and linked to bonuses from next month, just over a year after its previous head called the idea "complete c-p". The accounting giant's 15,300 U.K. staff could have their bonuses slashed if they refuse to attend future lessons on bias, which will highlight how discussing skiing holidays, gap years and private schooling can isolate others.

Scramble to stop Russian uranium fuelling Britain's nuclear power: EDF is seeking alternatives to Russian uranium used at one of its largest U.K. power stations amid the growing fallout from the war on Ukraine. Its Sizewell B station on the Suffolk coast is using uranium from Russia bought before the war and is set to be refuelled with pre-war stocks containing Russian uranium next year. The French state-owned company has about two years of uranium supply in stock for the station and said it was "considering alternative options for future refuelling".

Questor: the five investments you need to beat inflation: Inflation's surge to a 40-year high has caused widespread alarm. Anyone with wealth could see its value decline significantly in real terms. The Bank of England has even said inflation could reach 10%. Since its launch last year, Questor's Wealth Preserver portfolio has sought to overcome inflation and avoid steep falls by holding a diversified range of 28 assets. But some investors, especially those who are only now considering the threat to their savings, may want a simpler starting point. Here we suggest a five-investment portfolio to get you going. Companies that can pass rising costs on to their customers are best placed to cope with high inflation. Demand for tobacco has historically been less affected by price rises

than almost any other consumer product, so British American Tobacco is our chosen stock. The company continues to invest in less harmful products such as e-cigarettes, which adds to its long-term growth potential. These products generated a 51% rise in sales last year. It has also reduced its debts to strengthen its financial position, while a yield of 6.3% suggests that it offers good value for money. Commodities have a long record of outperformance in periods of high inflation. Investing in a company that produces a single commodity, however, would be risky so we've picked a diversified miner in BHP. Its price-to-earnings ratio of 14.5 suggests that it offers a margin of safety. The company continues to align its portfolio with long-term global growth trends. The renewable energy fund Greencoat U.K. Wind invests in onshore and offshore wind farms in Britain. It aims to maintain the value of its assets on an after-inflation basis over the long run while growing its dividend in line with the retail prices index measure of inflation. It currently yields 4.6% and trades at a premium of 5% to its net asset value. An exchange-traded commodity (ETC) fund such as the iShares Physical Gold ETC offers a simple and efficient means to gain exposure to the precious metal. We must acknowledge that gold's progress could be checked by impending interest rate rises in America, which increase the appeal of income-producing assets such as cash relative to gold. But the metal still deserves a place in a multi-asset anti-inflation portfolio. Scottish Mortgage is the obvious example but we will opt for its less high-octane and more diversified stablemate, Monks, which typically holds more than 100 stocks from across the world. It aims to deliver long-term capital growth and has outperformed its benchmark index over the past decade. It currently trades at a 7.8% discount to its asset value, which suggests that it offers good value for money.

Plans to keep passengers moving and shelves stocked as rail strike looms: Contingency plans are being drawn up to try to keep passenger and freight trains running and prevent empty supermarket shelves after unions warned of "potentially the biggest rail strike in modern history". The National Union of Rail, Maritime and Transport Workers (RMT) is balloting

40,000 members on the industrial action, which network sources have reportedly said would create "serious challenges" in keeping goods moving and supermarket shelves stocked.

Russia halts gas supplies to Finland as payments row with the west escalates:

Russia has halted providing natural gas to neighbouring Finland, which has angered Moscow by applying for Nato membership, after the Nordic country refused to pay supplier Gazprom in roubles. Gazprom Export has demanded that European countries pay for Russian gas supplies in roubles because of sanctions imposed over Moscow's invasion of Ukraine, but Finland refuses to do so.

U.K. pharmacists to offer alternatives to out of stock HRT products:

Pharmacists will be allowed to offer alternative hormone replacement therapy products if the original prescription is out of stock, under new rules aimed at tackling the ongoing shortage. Former rail Chief in Stonehaven crash train call: A FORMER rail company director has raised concerns over the continued use of the model of train involved in the Stonehaven crash, calling for speed limits to be introduced for the trains until they are removed from service. Former Network Rail

maintenance director John Carson, who was also connected to the Paddington inquiry, has raised safety issues over the continued use of the High Speed Train locomotives and carriages like those in the Scottish derailment. He has linked it to the Paddington tragedy, a crash involving two trains including an HST at Ladbroke Grove in London in 1999, when 31 were killed and 417 injured.
